Mark Bays will speak about the Oklahoma Survivor Tree at the April meeting. This tree survived the Oklahoma City bombing in April of 1995. Mr. Bays obtained his Forestry degree at OSU and worked in traditional forestry in Colorado and California as well as consulting in urban forestry, arboriculture and tree care in Oklahoma and Texas. Working with the Oklahoma Forestry Service for the last 25 years, he helps communities and administers forestry and tree planting projects statewide including recovery from catastrophic storms. Participating with the rescue and recovery of the "Survivor Tree" at the Oklahoma City National Memorial since 1996, Mark helps spread its message of hope and healing. His favorite quote: "The best time to plant a tree was 20 years ago. The second best time is now". The program will begin at 10, but come early for snacks and conversation at 9:30. See you there!

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Breakfast Casserole in the Crockpot

Ingredients

1 bag 26 oz. frozen hash browns

12 eggs, or use egg beaters

1 cup milk

1 tablespoon ground mustard

1 16 oz. roll sausage

maple, sage or regular sausage.

Salt and pepper

16 oz. bag shredded cheddar cheese

Spray crock pot and evenly spread hash browns at the bottom.

Crack 12 eggs in a large bowl. Mix well (and slowly) using a whisk.

Add the milk. Go ahead and sprinkle in the ground mustard. Add plenty of salt...and lots of fresh pepper. Mix well and set aside.

Cook the sausage on high

heat, drain and set aside. Add sausage on top of hash browns. Add the cheese. Mix it up well.

Pour the egg mixture over everything in the crock pot. Using a wood spoon, even everything out so it's spread evenly. Turn the crock pot on low for 6-8 hours.

Some fun variations of this recipe. Before cooking (during prep) you can add: chunks of sourdough bread, diced chiles, salsa, diced green onions.

This recipe cooks while you sleep. When you get up in the morning, you have a hot cooked breakfast that fills the house with a great aroma!
