Erdinger Hof Garlic Mashed Potatoes

Master Cook

Ingredients

8 to 10 Yukon gold potatoes -- (about 5 lbs.)

1/4 pound butter

1 cup buttermilk

2 teaspoons salt

2 teaspoons pepper

1/4 cup sour cream

1/3 cup olive oil

8 to 10 garlic cloves -- minced


Peel potatoes and boil until they start to fall apart. In a sauce pan, melt butter with buttermilk. Add salt, pepper and sour cream.

In a separate pan, heat oil and garlic. Let oil come to a simmer, then cut the heat and let stand for 2-3 minutes.

Drain potatoes. Add everything together in bowl of electric mixer and whip until smooth. Serves 6 to 8. Per Serving (excluding unknown items): 285 Calories; 22g Fat (69.8% calories from fat); 4g Protein; 18g Carbohydrate; 1g Dietary Fiber; 35mg Cholesterol; 692mg Sodium. Exchanges: o Grain(Starch);

o Vegetable; o Non-Fat Milk; 4 1/2 Fat.

NOTES: This was a restaurant recipe I requested of Bon Appetit magazine. I made these mashed potatoes for Thanksgiving using 5 large russet potatoes (I couldn't find Yukon Gold) and they tasted just as wonderful as they did at the Erdinger Hof in Durango, Colorado on our summer vacation! Later, I received a letter from Erich Owen, the executive chef at Erdinger Hof. He advised that a nice little "add on" to the garlic mashed potatoes is adding "a little feta or goat cheese in with the butter and heavy cream".
