Chicken Fajita Pot Pie

Master Cook

Ingredients

1 box Pillsbury refrigerated pie crusts (2 crusts)

15 ounces Old El Paso canned Spanish rice 4 1/2 ounces Old El Paso chopped green chiles 12 ounces Southwestern Chicken Breast Strips (2 - 6oz. pkgs.)

11 ounces Green Giant Mexicorn, drained 1/2 pound shredded Mexican blend cheese

Preheat oven to 425 F. Place 1 pie crust into a 10" deep dish pie plate.

In a large bowl, mix canned Spanish rice, chopped green chilies, Southwestern Chicken Breast Strips and Mexicorn. Spoon into crust-lined pie plate. Top with shredded cheese. Add remaining pie crust on top, crimping edges to seal. Cut slits in top crust.

Bake pot pie for 20 minutes at 425 F. or

until pie crust is nicely browned and filling is bubbling hot. Serves 8.

Mac's Pickled Beets

0	144	CONTRACTOR OF THE	4.0	Andrews .	Arthur V
2	cans (11 oz)	sliced beets	10	whole	cloves
1	small	red onion, cut in	1/2	tablespoon	allspice
		small chunks	1/2	tablespoon	cinnamon
3/4	cup	vinegar		200	salt and pepper
1/2	cup	sugar

- 1 Open cans of beets, reserve liquid from one can of beets.
- 2 Discard juice of the other.
- 3 In a sauce pan, put the liquid (not beets) of one can of beets and add the vinegar, the sugar and the whole cloves, allspice, cinnamon, add salt and pepper to taste.
- 4 Bring all to a boil and then reduce to simmer for 6 minutes.
- 5 Remove beet sauce from heat.
- 6 Strain out and discard the whole cloves.
- 7 Place drained sliced beets from the two cans and onion into a heat proof serving bowl of adequate size.
- 8 Pour hot beet sauce mixture over the sliced beets.
- 9 I recommend letting them cool to room temperature before refrigerating. Then refrigerate for at least 4-6 hours or overnight for optimum flavor.

Fewer than 10% of monarch eggs and larvae will survive to become adult butterflies, largely due to predation of the larvae. Raising them in an indoor habitat boosts survival to rates well over 90%. Last year alone, instructor Stephanie Jordan rescued and raised more than 100 monarchs as well as several other butterfly species she found in the gardens of the Commonwealth community. In this class, come learn where and how to look for eggs and larvae and how to support them as they go through their amazing transformation. Instructor: Steph Jordan, Beekeeper and Farm Manager of Organic Gardens.
