Upcoming Program






> must, and the only grass to plant is fes-

If you have a large lot or are looking for landscaping ideas for grand or intimate spaces, this is the place.











Three entertainment areas, sun, and shade gardens, raised beds, brick pathways, water features, and an appealing mix of vintage and contemporary architectural all function together in this small suburban lot.

John, an interior designer professionally, leaves his fastidiousness at the office. The garden is a carefree and dense display of colors, textures, heights, and shapes. For some gardeners, less is more. For John, more is more. "If I see dirt, it needs to be filled." He doesn't have a color plan. "I just go to the nursery and buy what I like," says John. The Basics of Food Preservation

Saturday, July 15th 10:00-11:00




Photo credit: Kitchen Sink This session will provide an overview of the different types of food preservation including refrigeration, freezing, canning, and drying foods. Participants will learn about the two safe methods of canning foods at home which are water bath canning and pressure canning. For safe home canning it is essential to use the correct canning method and equipment for the type of food you are canning. We will review what equipment is needed and the importance of following guidelines for the type of food, the size of jar, and packing methods for canning foods. We will also discuss the importance of testing pressure canner dial gauges annually.

Cheesy "Crack"

Ingredients

1 4.25 oz bag Chester's Puffcorn Cheese Flavor <u>or</u> 1 3.25 oz bag Chester's Puffcorn Buller Flavor 12 oz Almond Bark Pour entire bag of Puffcorn in to a large mixing bowl. Chop up Almond Bark and microwave in a micro safe bowl for 30 second increments until melted (may want to stir between each 30 seconds). Pour melted Almond Bark over Puffcorn and stir until all pieces are well coated (*). Spread coated Puffcorn on a parchment lined baking sheet & allow to cool & harden. Once cooled, break up and store in an airtight contain-

er.

*You can add festive holiday sprinkles to the plain puffcorn at this point as you like. Makes great gifts for friends for the holidays.

Note: Debbie has brought this to a couple of potlucks, and it is always a hit!

Simple But Delicious Jello Salad

Ingredients

8 oz. Cool Whip*

8 oz. Sour cream*

8 oz. Cottage cheese*

Small can of crushed pineapple

1.5 cups mini marshmallows (or as many you like)

1 small pkg of jello, any flavor

*(Either light or fat free work fine)

Thoroughly drain the pineapple and mix all the ingredients together. It's better if you let it sit in the fridge overnight (or at least a few hours) before serving so it firms up.
