President Judy Kautz called the meeting to order, requested that everyone silence their phones, and led the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag.

She reminded members that the Meeting Minutes are contained in the monthly newsletter for review. A Correction to the President Comments in the April minutes: Judy presented a quilt made by Brenda Williams with CCMGA member's signatures to Theresa January because she is moving.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: (Nancy Logan) Balance as of March 2019--\$19,679.55. Income was \$7,347.225 and expenses totaled \$1,655.10 leaving a cash balance of \$25,371.70 with \$11,390.97 specifically budgeted and \$400 reserved for Greenhouse Repairs. Funds in Excess of Budget as of April 25, 2019 are \$13,580.74

<u>Greenhouse Report</u>: (Nancy Logan) Gross Plant Sales: \$8,111.00 less Sales Tax \$416.25 and expense \$1786.20 totals \$5908.20 less 10% (595.82) greenhouse maintenance equals \$5317.38. In addition, there was \$171 donations, \$171 raffle and \$10 hypertufa pots for a net profit of \$5,669.38. This is \$874 more than 2018.

Treasurer's Report

Beginning balance as of April 25, 2019 is \$25,371.70. Income includes \$40 Gloves Sold; \$20 2019 Dues; \$3 Nametag Jar; \$10 Meeting Donations; \$171 Plant Party Donations; \$386 Plant Party Raffles and \$985.18 Plant Sales for Total Income of \$1,615.18. Expense includes \$566.20 DemoGarden; \$215 Plant Party Raffles; \$416.25 Plant Sale Sales Tax; \$21.70 Hospitality; \$91.66 Public Relations and \$1,000 Scholarship for Total Expense of \$2,310.81. Balance at May 25, 2019 is \$24,676.07, less budgeted expenses not yet reimbursed of \$9,080.16 and less reserve for greenhouse repairs of \$591, leaving funds in excess of budget at \$15,004.91.



Salted Pretzel Rolls

Master Cook

Ingredients

½ cup Warm Water (110 F)

11/8t Active Yeast

1 t Sugar

34 cup Milk

1 t Salt

4 ½ t Oil

4 1/4 cup Flour

2 t Salt

1 t Baking Soda

Coarse Salt

In a large bowl, dissolve yeast and sugar in water; let stand 5 to 10 minutes. Beat in milk, 1 t. salt and oil. Beat in 2 c. flour; let stand 10 minutes.

Add more flour to make a soft dough. Knead dough 8 to 10 minutes and place in greased bowl. Cover and let rise until doubled.

Punch dough down; divide into 12 pieces. Roll each piece into a long, very thin rope and loop into pretzel shape. Cover and let rise 10 minutes.

Preheat oven to 425 F. Bring large saucepan of water to a boil. Add 2 t. salt and baking soda. Drop pretzel into boiling water and as soon as they rise to the surface, remove. Place on thick towel to drain.

Transfer to greased baking sheet. Make angular incisions on surface of each pretzel; sprinkle generously with coarse salt. Bake until lightly browned (15 to 20 minutes). Cool on wire rack.

Sausage Breakfast Casserole

Ingredients

6 Slices bread with crusts removed Butter

2 lbs Sausage

1 cup Cheddar cheese shredded 1 cup Velveeta cheese shredded

1 tsp Dry mustard

6 Eggs, beaten

2-1/2 cups Half & Half

Salt and pepper to taste

1 cup Cornflakes crumbled and mixed with 1-1/2 Tbsp. melted butter

Butter one side of bread slices. Place butter side up in 13x9x2 pan. (Six slices fit perfectly in this size pan. If you want to use a larger pan, use 8 slices of bread and leave everything else the same.)

Cook sausage until browned, stirring to crumble. Drain well. Spoon over bread and sprinkle with cheeses.

Combine eggs, mustard, half & half, salt and pepper. Mix well and pour over cheese. Cover casserole and chill overnight. Remove from refrigerator 15 min. before baking. Top with cornflakes.

Bake uncovered 325 - 350 degrees for 1 hour. Let set 30 min. before serving.

Note: Cindy brought this casserole to our meeting last month and many asked for the recipe!



Fewer than 10% of monarch eggs and larvae will survive to become adult butterflies, largely due to predation of the larvae. Raising them in an indoor habitat boosts survival to rates well over 90%. Last year alone, instructor Stephanie Jordan rescued and raised more than 100 monarchs as well as several other butterfly species she found in the gardens of the Commonwealth community. In this class, come learn where and how to look for eggs and larvae and how to support them as they go through their amazing transformation. Instructor: Steph Jordan, Beekeeper and Farm Manager of Organic Gardens.
