



GROWING OKLAHOMA NATIVE PLANTS IN THE NORMAN AREA

Fred Schneider, a Cleveland County Master Gardener, will give a power point presentation on Growing Native Plants at 10 a.m. on Saturday, Nov. 19th, in classroom "C" at the Cleveland County Extension office located at 600 E. Robison. Fred has been conducting research on Native American use of Native Plants and grows plants suitable for the Norman area. Topics to be discussed include: What are Native Plants? Why might I want to grow them? Where can I find these plants? What issues should be recognized and addressed before planting any plant? Where might I go to see displays of these plants. In addition, how have Oklahoma Tribes used these plants?

Oklahoma is a unique state in that the greater OKC region including Norman is located at the intersection of four major plant ecoregions. It is possible to grow plants in this region that cannot be successfully grown in many areas of the state. Our state is a locale of 2,600 native plants!

There will be a display of appropriate books, pamphlets, Extension Fact Sheets, information on the Oklahoma Native Plant Society, and information on the Master Gardener program. See the class flyer on the next page

Expenses were \$765.00 Demo Garden, \$201.05 Greenhouse Sale 2023, and \$415.50 Materials for Day of Caring for a total of \$1,382.55. Balance as of September 30, 2022, is \$28,153.19 less budgeted expenses not yet reimbursed of \$6,757.92 and less reserve for greenhouse repairs of \$1,913.00, leaving funds in excess of budget at \$19,482.27. Dues will be raised to \$30 for 2023. The reporting of Service and Education hours is not due until the end of the year.

Onion Apple Glazed Pork Tenderloin

Ingredients

1 1/2 lbs. pork tenderloin
Ground black pepper
2 Tbsp. olive oil
1 envelope Lipton® Recipe Secrets® Onion Soup Mix
1/2 cup apple juice
2 Tbsp. firmly packed brown sugar
3/4 cup water
1/4 cup dry red wine or water

1 Tbsp. all-purpose flour

- 1. Preheat oven to 425°. In small roasting or baking pan, arrange pork. Season with pepper and rub with 1 tablespoon Olive Oil. Roast uncovered 10 minutes.
- 2. Meanwhile, in small bowl, combine remaining Olive Oil, Lipton® Recipe Secrets® Onion Soup Mix , apple juice and brown sugar. Pour over pork and continue roasting 10 minutes or until pork is done. Remove pork

to serving platter; cover with aluminum foil.

3. Place roasting pan over medium-high heat and bring pan juices to a boil, scraping up any brown bits from bottom of pan. Stir in water, wine and flour and boil, stirring constantly, 1 minute or until thickened. To serve, thinly slice pork and serve with gravy.

Note: I used two pork tenderloin strips. I baked them until their internal temperature reached 145°. I also added two red apples, sliced thickly into rounds, the placed on the bottom of baking sheet under the pork tenderloins.

Makes 6 servings
