Sara grew up in Virginia and had parents who did not garden. However, her neighbor planted tulips in the fall (by the thousands) and taught her how to forage for wild blackberries to make cobblers. Sara was a Paramedic in Alexandria, VA before getting married and having kids. While visiting her (gardening Grandma) in the hospital, she was encouraged to grow plants and given a Park Seed magazine. This love of plants grew from herbs growing in a container to a Community Supported Agriculture. This led to horticulture classes at Tulsa Community College, working with community gardens in Tulsa, and moving to Stillwater to continue her horticulture degree at OSU. She then got a master's in Entomology and Plant Pathology. She worked for a year at ODAFF and now is your second plant diagnostician for the state. She comes to us from the Plant Disease and Insect Diagnostic Lab at OSU.

### Treasurer's Report

Beginning balance as of September 30, 2023 is \$35,300.32. Income was \$75 Gloves Sold; \$10 Meeting Donations; \$10 Old T-Shirts Sold and \$50 Fair Judging Stipend for Total income of \$145.00. Expenses were \$200 Greenhouse Repairs; \$870.73 Demo Garden Expenses; \$182.45 Greenhouse Supplies; \$88.31 Hospitality Supplies and \$2,000 2024-25 Horticulture Scholarships for Total expenses of \$3,341.49. Balance at October 31, 2023 is \$32,103.83, less budgeted expenses, not yet reimbursed, of \$4,431.81 and less reserve for greenhouse repairs of \$2,797.10, leaving funds in excess of budget at \$24,874.92.


