

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

Jalapeno Tartar Sauce

Master Cook

Ingredients

- 1 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tablespoons dill pickle relish
- 2 scallions -- minced
- 1 tablespoons drained capers
- 1 jalapeno -- seeded and minced
- 1 teaspoon dried dill

Place all ingredients in a bowl and whisk together. Cover and refrigerate for at least 1 hour before serving. (Can transfer to an airtight container and refrigerate for up to 1 week.)

Yield: 1 cup

Pumpkin Oatmeal Cookies

Ingredients

1/2 teaspoon salt

1 teaspoon ground cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg

1-1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

1-1/2 cups quick-cooking oats

1/2 cup flaked coconut

1/2 cup chopped walnuts

3/4 cup (1-1/2 sticks) butter

1-1/2 cups sugar

2 eggs

1 cup canned 100% pure pumpkin (not pie filling)

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

1-1/2 cups all-purpose flour

2 teaspoon baking powder

1/2 teaspoon baking soda

Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Coat baking sheets with cooking spray. In a large bowl, cream together the butter and sugar, then add eggs, pumpkin, and vanilla, blending well. In a separate bowl, combine the flour, baking powder, baking soda, salt, cinnamon, nutmeg, and cloves; add to the pumpkin mixture and mix well. Mix in the oats, coconut, and walnuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls onto prepared baking sheets.

Bake 10 to 12 minutes. Makes 5 dozen cookies.
