## Keep Oklahoma Beautiful Award

The Green Team of University Lutheran Church & Student Center (ULCSC) announced that ULCSC's Foam Recycling program has been selected as one of four Finalists in the "2023 Keep Oklahoma Beautiful" (KOB) statewide Environmental Excellence Awards competition! In KOB's words, this award honors "the best of the environmental best in Oklahoma" each year. Unbeknownst to the church's Green Team, the City of Norman's Environmental and Sustainability Manager, Michele Loudenback, nominated the project. (The official notification letter is on page 3.)

The program is in rare company as a Finalist; a David and Goliath scenario! The other Finalists are: OKC Beautiful, the Tulsa Garden Club (established in 1929) and The Metropolitan Environmental Trust (a collaboration of 12 Tulsa-area governments that work together to benefit the environment).

The awards dinner, celebration and silent auction will be November 17 at 5:00 p.m. in the National Cowboy and Western Heritage Museum. This is the KOB annual fundraiser. Depending on numbers of attendees per table, the tickets are from \$90 -97.

October 21st community education class subject is Faerie Gardens. It will be held from 10:00 -11;00 am In the classroom "C" of the OSU extension building, located at 601 East Robinson, Norman, OK (See the class flyer on page 5.)

Brittany Jordan will be sharing her love of faerie gardening. She became a Master Gardener in 2017 when she and her husband purchased 4 acres together. She realized that it was not going to turn into the oasis she dreamed it could be on its own, so she set out to teach herself what she needed to know. She not only became a certified master gardener, but she also worked at Prairie Wind Nursery until it closed in 2020. She learned about native plants, grasses, succulents, and culinary herbs. Brittany currently manages three gardens in the MG demonstration garden; Morticia's garden, the faerie garden, and the raised accessible beds. She also serves on the advisory team for LoveWorks Community, where she and fellow Master Gardeners are working to reestablish that garden space for an after-school leadership programs. If you're lucky, you may find Brittany selling succulents at the Farmer's Market in Norman.

These scholarships are funded by donations to the college or university and by state and national organizations and companies.

As there were far fewer scholarships for graduate students, this means that OSU recognizes, as does CCMGA, how wonderful Courtney is.






Styrofoam recycling

Beginning balance as of August 31, 2023 is \$36,444.58. No income for the month. Expenses were \$30 Speaker Honorarium: \$50 Meals on Wheels Vendor Charge: \$48.90 Greenhouse Fan Repair and \$1,015.36 Greenhouse Seeds, Soil & Pots for Total expenses of \$1,144.26. Balance at September 30, 2023 is \$35,300.32, less budgeted expenses\*, not yet reimbursed, of \$7,773.30 and less reserve for greenhouse repairs of \$3,046.00, leaving funds in excess of budget at \$24,481.02.

\*The budget was increased this month to include an additional scholarship of \$1,000 and an additional \$1,000 to fund greenhouse supplies.

## Eggplant, Ground Beef, and Italian Sausage Lasagna

#### **Ingredients**

Cooking spray

9 lasagna noodles

½ lb. ground beef

½ to 1 lb. Bulk Italian Sausage

1 onion chopped.

2 teaspoons Italian Seasoning

4 fresh mushrooms sliced, or 1 4 oz can sliced mushrooms.

2 cloves garlic, crushed.

2 (14.5 ounce) cans Italian-flavored crushed or minced tomatoes

1 medium eggplant, peeled and thinly sliced.

2 cups mozzarella and cheddar cheese blend (add more mozzarella if desired) Step 1—Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F.

Step 2—Peel eggplant and slice thinly onto wax paper. Sprinkle lightly with salt.

Step 3—Grease the bottom and sides of a 9X13 inch baking dish.

Step 4—Cook lasagna noodles according to package directions until tender yet firm to the bite. Drain in colander and set aside.

Step 5—Cook and stir the ground beef, Italian sausage, onion, mushrooms, and garlic until the meat is completely browned, about 10 minutes. Sprinkle with

Italian seasoning.

Step 6—Stir tomatoes into meat; simmer until sauce has formed, 3-4 minutes. A can of tomato sauce and a little more Italian seasoning can be added at this point if a little thicker sauce is desired.

Step 7—Pour about ¼ of the sauce into the bottom of the prepared baking dish. Layer noodles on top of sauce. Spread a thin layer of sauce on top of the noodles.

Step 8—Place a layer of eggplant slices on top of noodle and sauce layer. Sprinkle about ¼ of the cheese on top of eggplant slices.

Step 9—Repeat layering with remaining ingredients, until ending with a layer of sauce topped with remaining cheese.

Step 10—Bake in the preheated oven until cheese is bubbly and brown on top, about 40 minutes.
