Education Updates





(This article appeared in the Norman Transcript Sep 3, 2017) Cleveland County Master Gardeners maintain a Demonstration and Teaching Garden at the Cleveland County Fairgrounds, just west of the large gravel parking lot. The garden was established in 2000 with just three beds and has grown considerably since that time – today there are 42 beds in the garden! Its purpose is to aid in community awareness of sound horticultural practices and help our community members to be more successful with their gardening ventures. The gardens are open from April to the end of October and master gardeners offer tours of the gardens on Saturday mornings from 9 am until noon, and from 9 am until 3 pm during the Cleveland County Fair.

Each bed in the garden has a caretaker – a master gardener who plans and plants the bed each year, and who tends the bed during the growing season. This group of gardeners, the garden committee, works in the garden on Tuesday mornings, weeding and nurturing the plants in their beds with lots of tender loving care. They often purchase or bring items from home to decorate their beds, all for the delight of those who visit the garden.

Two weeks ago when the gardeners showed up for their work day in the gardens, they found a hole cut in the fence at one corner of the garden. They began a search through their beds to see if anything was missing. Much to their dismay, thieves had stolen several valuable items, many of them decorative objects donated by the gardeners themselves. The gardeners were stunned, as this had never happened before in the history of the demonstration gardens!

Items stolen included all the pink wrought iron furniture from the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Awareness bed. The carved stone eagle that graced the red, white and blue Veteran's Honor Bed is also missing, as is the garden bench with stars on the back that sat between these two beds. Not satisfied with simply taking the eagle, these robbers also trampled the white petunias blooming around the eagle's perch!

The imaginative Serendipity Garden is missing its gazing ball and stand, as well as the whimsical cat and dog planters that delighted the children who visited this bed. They took the stone pagoda from the newest garden, the Zen garden, and you can no longer sit in the Sit Beside the Containers bed because the thieves stole its bench. These robbers also took several items which are vital to the maintenance of the gardens – a garden wagon, a wheel barrow and garden hoses!

Needless to say, these thefts are devastating to the gardeners who lovingly tend the demonstration gardens. We all feel violated and angry, and, unfortunately, we have little hope of recovering any of these items. They are most likely for sale in a flea market or garage sale somewhere. However, we will press on with restoring our beds and replacing the maintenance tools, because we want to ensure our gardens will continue to educate and delight the community members who will visit during the next few months.

Members of the new class were recognized. Alice Humphrey reminded members that the T-shirt sales were not a fund raiser.

Treasurer Report: (Nancy Logan) Cash balance ending 6/25 was \$19,136.80. Funds available for the 2017 budget were \$14,881.39.

<u>Demonstration Garden</u> (Theresa January): The garden is beautiful and flooded. The Saturday tour may have to be canceled. More people are needed on Tuesday to work in the garden. Even with no email, there will be work in the garden, unless there are heavy rains. The refrigerator in the pergola is out so if anyone has one to donate it would be appreciated. The garden committee is looking into replacing the trash cans throughout the garden. The old ones are looking worn. Volunteers will be needed for tours all day Friday and Saturday during the fair. 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Corn Casserole By Judy Kautz

Ingredients

- 1 (15 oz) can whole kernel corn, drained
- 1 (15 oz) can cream-style corn
- 1 package Jiffy corn muffin mix (8 oz.)
- 1 cup sour cream
- 1/2 cup butter, melted
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese or your favorite kind

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Mix all ingredients, minus the cheese, together and pour into a greased baking dish.



After the casserole has baked for 45 minutes, or is set in the middle and golden brown,

sprinkle with cheddar and put it back in the oven. Let the cheese melt, take the casserole out and enjoy this ridiculously buttery dish.

Arroz Verde (Rice)

Ingredients

1/2 c. tightly packed fresh cilantro 1 poblano chili, roasted, peeled, and seeded

3/4 c. water or chicken stock

1 t. salt


₂ T. olive oil

1 c. long grain rice

½ c. minced onion

2 cloves garlic, minced

34 c. chicken broth



Santa Fe School of Cooking

Place the cilantro, chili, water or stock and salt in blender and puree until well combined. Set aside.

In a heavy pot over medium heat, add the olive oil and rice. Stir the rice until the grains turn opaque and begin to turn a light beige, about 5 minutes. Add the onion and cook, stirring for 1 minute. Ad the garlic and continue stirring for 1 minute more. Add the chicken broth and the green mixture from the blender, stirring well to combine.

Bring the rice to a boil. Cover the pot and reduce the heat to very low. Cook for 25 minutes. Remove the cover, stir

the rice and cook 5 minutes more. Remove the pot from the heat, cover rice with a paper towel and replace the lid. Allow the rice to steam for 10 minutes.
