Hope that everyone had a lovely holiday break, because ——— even though it is not outside work time yet, it is time for all garden bed caretakers to prepare and submit budget requests. Please e-mail them to me by the end of January or leave a copy in the Extension office. I would love a copy with your name and bed name even if the request is for zero dollars because that would help confirm that each bed has a caretaker for 2017. The plan is to submit the overall budget request at the February meeting. There will be work projects that need to be completed early, i.e., before regular work days, including digging grass and some plants in order to swap locations of the existing rose and Tepee beds. Another project will be removing the remaining compost from the large cinder block bin so that area can be set up to demonstrate container gardening. So, yes, there will be e-mails asking for help. We still have important garden committee positions that need to be filled; scheduling garden tours, spraying weeds in pathway areas, and a mentor for 2016 students who will be working on two sections of the quad bed. 

A listing of the year's classes is in the newsletter. The committee will meet after the holidays. They are always looking for new topics. Kathi recommended shadowing a committee head to see how it runs.

Programs: (Marilyn Solomon) Linda Wren has assumed the role of chair for the program committee.

Chinese Fried Rice

Master Cook

Ingredients

6 slices bacon 2 c cooked rice

3 T soy sauce

1/4 c water

3 eggs, beaten

Fry bacon on medium heat until crisp; remove and crumble.

Add rice to hot bacon grease and cook on medium heat until heated through.

Add soy sauce and water slowly and cook until no liquid remains.

Add crumbled bacon to the rice and stir until combined. Stir eggs into hot rice mixture and cook until set. Makes 4 servings.

NOTES: One cup uncooked rice cooked in 2 c. salted water will yield 3 c. cooked rice. I add the whole 3 c. rice to the bacon grease and the recipe turns out perfect!

Crock Pot Cashew Chicken

Ingredients

2 lbs boneless, skinless chicken thigh tenders or chicken breast tenders

1/4 cup all purpose flour

1/2 tsp black pepper

1 Tbsp canola oil

1/4 cup soy sauce

2 Tbsp rice wine vinegar

2 Tbsp ketchup

1 Tbsp brown sugar

1 garlic clove, minced

1/2 tsp grated fresh ginger

1/4 tsp red pepper flakes

1/2 cup cashews



Combine flour and pepper in large Ziploc bag. Add chicken. Shake to coat with flour mixture. Heat oil in skillet over medium-high heat.

Brown chicken about 2 minutes on each side. Place chicken in slow cooker. Combine soy sauce, vinegar, ketchup, sugar, garlic, ginger, and pepper flakes in small bowl; pour over chicken. Cook on LOW for 3 to 4 hours. Add cashews and stir.

Serve over rice. Makes 4-6 servings. If you want like sauce and want to have some to pour over the chicken and the rice, double the sauce ingredients.

Note: This recipe is fairly salty; use reduced sodium soy sauce for less saltiness.
